Stay Safe—and Warm—this Winter

Did you know that nationwide each year, nearly 1,100 people die in fires caused by faulty or improperly used home heating equipment and 700 people die of hypothermia?

The good news is that there are steps you can take to help prevent these tragedies in your own home. First, here are some simple, yet important fire safety guidelines:

- Have your home heating equipment inspected annually by a professional.
- Keep portable space heaters at least three feet from anything flammable, including bedding, clothing and furniture. Keep children and pets away from space heaters and ALWAYS turn them off when you leave the room.
- Kerosene heaters should be kept in a ventilated room to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Only use the fuel recommended by the manufacturer and refuel the heater outside.
- Have your chimney, fireplace or wood/pellet-burning stove professionally cleaned each year. Only burn seasoned wood in your fireplace.
- Never use your oven or stove to heat your home.
- Check or replace your smoke detector batteries twice a year (you should have a working smoke detector in every bedroom and on each floor of your home).

The other extreme, hypothermia, is caused by extended exposure to cold temperatures. The elderly are particularly prone to hypothermia. Many hypothermia cases are linked to power outages that left the victim without heat for an extended period of time. Here are some tips to help you plan ahead in case of unexpected heat loss:

- Dress in layers.
- Have plenty of dry blankets on hand both at home and in your car.
- Keep dry, even while exercising. Excess sweat can cause a rapid drop in body temperature.
- Avoid alcohol consumption.
- Huddle together to stay warm.
